VETS TO OBSERVE MEMORIAL DAY

Chisholmites are Asked to Aid in Suitable Services for Departed

Suitable observance of Memorial Day will be the efforts of the local camp of Spanish-American War Veterans from now until, Sunday, May 30, the day set aside to honor the nation's soldier dead. The Vets held a meeting Tuesday evening and outlined their program. They will endeavor to have the council purchase a wreath of flowers and bring out the Commercial band. After services at the M. E. church at 10.30 o'clock A. M. a parade will start from the village hall on Sunday, afternoon at 2 o'clock, and proceed to the cemetery where the Hon. Joseph Austin will deliver an oration and where the graves of the departed will be decorated. The school children, boy scouts and all interested citizens will join the parade, which it is hoped will be headed by the Commercial band. Civil War Veterans Cass and Hubbard will lead the parade as guests of honor of the Spanish-American War Veterans. For the past two years the local veterans and citizens have honored the day with the Hibbing militia, at Hibbing and this will be the first attempt to observe the day in Chisholm. Everyone is invited to help make the day successful and a credit to the town.

LONGYEAR LAKE TO HAVE BOATS

Beginning of Attempt to Make Lake Attractive to Chisholmites and Visitors.

The gasoline launch and row boats to be used for pleasure purposes on Longyear lake arrived Monday and were launched Wednesday. The outfit consists of an 18-passenger gasoline launch, three row boats and one canoe and were shipped here to the order of J. J. Hayes. Mr. Hayes has built two docks, one on the eastern and the other on the western shore of Longyear lake. The boats will leave either shore when passenger traffic demands. On the eastern shore is the new municipal lake which has been made most attractive to Chisholmites and visitors through the efforts of the village council, the green grass, shrubs, flowers, trees and rustic benches presenting a refreshing appearance after viewing the rock bound stretches of country so plentiful here. At the park is a menagerie, which contains many animals and birds and pleases the children immensely. The pleasure boats promise to be popular, a large concourse of people being at the lake to watch the unloading from the railway freight cars. The boats will be used for conveying passengers and pleasure seekers to the Athletic Girls picnic next Sunday.
