CHISHOLM HAS BEST SCHOOLS

Eulogies Refute Charges That Money is Extravagantly and Uselessly Spent.

Richard Henry Little, special writer for the Chicago Herald, came to town last week to investigate for the paper, the charges of extravagance made against range municipalities and school boards by one Harrison in the house of representatives. The result of his visit was a two column story in which he humorously treated the matter, showing that his sympathies were not with the mining companies. In an interview with the editor of this highly respectable family journal after his visit to the high school Mr. Little said, "My visit to your school is the finest day I have spent in many years. The work done there is truly wonderful and I feel that I cannot do it justice in the columns of the Chicago Herald. I cannot see anything in your plain, strong, dignified buildings that you should not have. Your superintendent's work and the spirit shown is the finest I have ever seen and that is not dependent upon the expenditure of money." This coming on top of State School Inspector E. M. Phillips' statement when last here, should be sufficient refutation of the charge that money is being extravagantly and uselessly expended in Chisholm.
